Important Note: I revised the Financial Comparison Full Report document. A couple of things happened. First of all, as I was working on the Millville report, I regularly cross referenced my work with the Nackawic report to be sure I was being consistent and to watch for errors. In doing this, I found a few small errors (salary of an administrative assistant was off and a couple of small calculation errors). Also, since I completed the Nackawic report, I have seen the kindergarten registration numbers for next year. The numbers for Nackawic Elementary are up...they are at 26. With this, I changed my projected numbers for next year to 31 (based on some historic trends in kindergarten registration). While this didn't change the number of projected classrooms needed for NES on its own, it did change the number of projected classrooms needed for NES and MES combined, either at the elementary school or at the middle school for scenario. With this in mind, I

re-did the numbers and have posted a revised report. While similar in looks, you will see revised numbers. I also took an opportunity to adjust some wording in the report.

Oops...I didn't scroll down before replying! I see you found the answer. #1 priorities are generally related to health and safety or things like leaking roofs that will lead to considerable damage. #2 priorities are not urgent in nature but are items related to upgrades to assist in improved program delivery or building status. #3 priorities are projects that have been identified as items for general improvement of the facility or grounds but, again, less urgent and more for aesthetics with general improvement. The list is a "living document" and the facilities team makes adjustments to the database throughout the year. In March/April, they fine tune the list and present it to the District Education Council who, in turn, approve a prioritized list to submit to government. Government then finalizes the approved list of projects for the next fiscal year and assigns the dollars to complete the projects. The announcement is usually in December or January, with work beginning after March and mostly in the summer. Although it is rare, it has happened that a 2 was approved prior to a 1 due to unique circumstance and alignment of money to support a program.

Here is a response to a number of questions that were listed in a post a couple of weeks ago. If you find I have missed something from that post, please point it out and I will try to find the answer. A report on associated costs is almost complete. It will be posted very soon.

For Nackawic Elementary moving to Nackawic Middle, we have checked out the following: If there was a need to remove lockers, it would be done by our district staff and would be at a minimal cost. The costs for installing coat hooks on a pine board outside classrooms would be approximately \$150 per classroom. The costs for installing metal coat and book racks would be approximately \$2000 per classroom. We are projecting a need for 11 elementary classrooms. To accommodate K-2 students, two urinals would need to be lowered. Our staff can do this so it would be a minimal cost. Likewise, a water fountain would be lowered at a minimal cost by our staff. We estimate the cost of relocating desks, chairs, bookshelves and other items to be about \$5000. As it stands now, there are empty classrooms that would be available to new, elementary classes. The functional capacity definition of classroom sees us with 17 and the projected number of rooms should we have a K-8 is 18.

Obviously, there is some consideration required on how this accommodation could be made. If the elementary moved over, the middle school as it stands now would lose space and a variety of rooms used for activity and other special purposes. Likewise, space that is currently being rented out would not be available. Structurally, the rooms wouldn't require much change to welcome the elementary classes. Gym space allocation would be the responsibility of the school administration, through a

scheduling process. There is a very nice gym at the middle school. Although the 17-18 room scenario is something that requires consideration, a permanent addition may not be required. It may be that another room (not defined as a "classroom" under functional capacity terms) could be used or a team teaching scenario may be considered. Modular classrooms are often used to address a need for additional space. Gym modifications would include lowering the basketball nets for elementary use at a cost of approximately \$3600. We would need to explore further the idea of moving the gym unit from the elementary school to the high school. If safe to move, the administration and PE teaching staff would need to determine the desire and if it was decided to move it, our district staff could do so at a minimal cost. History says I should never "guarantee" anything in a move as there are times when things happen beyond our control. We would be fully committed to making the move as seamless and timely as possible. The middle school as one large soccer field and additional green space that could be used as a sports field, if required. At the elementary school, there is one large play structure, two metal climbers, and 3 swing sets. The annual playground inspections will be carried out in the next few weeks and a determination will be made as to what may be able to be relocated and installed to meet today's CSA standards. While there is a cost associated with moving playground equipment or purchasing new equipment, it is unknown at this time. I will be preparing a Millville report, as well, however prepping the Middle School for the move of one elementary or two elementary is very much equivalent. The same analysis on the playground equipment at Millville would need to be done, although it is possible that the equipment would stay there if there was suitable equipment in place.

For a move from the middle school to the high school, we have looked at the following. The classroom assignments would still be the same, respecting the maximum class sizes as noted in the Teacher's Collective Agreement. For middle level classes, 1.2 FTE is assigned per classroom. We would expect 7 classrooms at middle level. The high school FTE is assigned based on a formula of 1.0 FTE per 12.4 students for the first 100 and 1.0 FTE per 19.7 students for the next 300. I don't anticipate classes that would be available to high school students due to a change in space. Those decisions are made on an annual basis by school administration, normally based on student request, teacher expertise and the prescribed curriculum. The projected enrolment would be 397 and there was a day when this many students attended the school. There is still much to be determined regarding renovations that are required at NHS, based on the damaged wing. There would not necessarily need to be classroom adjustments for middle school children attending a high school setting (compared to elementary moving to middle). The gym use would need to be scheduled by the school administration and the Phys Ed staff. We will always strive towards supporting schools in remaining effective...that is our key role.

The floor tiles in the elementary school are good...I have adjusted the capital improvement list on the power point and the Nackawic Elementary Infrastructure Summary.

If the elementary students were to move to the middle school, then I expect there would not be space to rent during the day, although the elementary school would be declared as surplus and government would decide what to do with this asset. The same scenario exists if the ML were to go to the HS. Having said this, after school rentals and community gym space use would continue (assuming this

his happening now).

You have now seen that the date for Public Meeting #2 is December 15.

Three pages from the Power Point Presentation (Public Meeting #1) have been adjusted. On Page 15, I adjusted the opening line to indicate that this FTE is how the schools are staffed for this year. The provincial funding formula would have revealed slightly different numbers. On Page 25, I added some revised numbers for projections (based on enrolment that has changed since I created the PP) as well as the functional capacity. I had accidently used the number 18 as the number of classrooms instead of 17. 18 is the number of homerooms we would expect in a K-8 school and 17 is the number of classrooms that have been defined as "classrooms" in the functional capacity formula. On Page 46, I indicated that the retiling of floors is no longer required in the capital improvement project list, which reduced the final amount to \$280 000 (from \$295 000).

However, the province has had structural engineers look at the wing and there is some debate on what next steps should be...should it be repaired or should it be torn down. We did a space utilization study this week and are meeting with officials from EECD (today, actually) to discuss this further. When we are confident about next steps, it will be shared. We have two Public DEC meetings left prior to Christmas. November 26 will be in Woodstock and December 17 will be in Fredericton. The agendas are posted on the website under the DEC tab, usually a week in advance. Minutes get posted the following month, after being formally approved by Council. My best guess is that Nackawic will be discussed in November, although the agenda has not be created yet.

ASD-W is going to be working with EECD and DTI (Education and Transportation/Infrastructure as provincial departments) in trying to determine the future of this wing. To allow time for a more clear picture, the DEC has decided to postpone the November 24th Public Meeting #2 in Nackawic to Tuesday, December 15. I will write to parents on Friday or Monday (at the latest) and post the letter to this site. I have made some

progress on the "What-If" report...I have some staffing data, some global budget data and some facilities data. Now I need to take the time to pull it all together for the anticipated report. I hope to have this completed next week. The rescheduling of the meeting gives all of us a bit more breathing room, but I won't abandon it altogether...I want to get it done ASAP.

I have Facilities Staff visiting Nackawic next week to gather information based on some of the requests below. Some other points I can comment on now.

If NES were to move to NMS, there shouldn't be an impact with respect to lockers. There would be the installation of hooks, etc. and we have experience with that from Bath. Our Facilities Staff will update me further on this. We will also be able to pull from our experience in Bath when we look at changes to bathrooms, fountains and classrooms...again, more to come. Sharing of gym space would fall to the school administration as they prepare timetables/schedules. We need to look closely at space and the number of classrooms as a part of the study. If a move was made, a list of corresponding actions would be developed and we would work through them...I am not sure what people may be looking for in a guarantee.

The playground equipment is among the items being explored by staff next week. As I build reports, I will also take into account a "what-if" for Millville.

For NMS to NHS as a "what-if", classroom configurations would be examined carefully. The four damaged classrooms situation also needs to be a factor in the reflections made in the study. This falls under the renovation considerations.

Facilities staff is going to report back on the floors.

Community Use of Schools (rentals) is a positive aspect of our system. We would continue with the community use of schools as space and availability presents.

I will continue working on the Nackawic Study this weekend and throughout the next week. DMcT

## NES TO MOVE TO NMS (K-8)

Removal of lockers

Installment of hooks etc

How the bathroom and fountains will be changed to accommodate K-2

Cost of relocation of desk, chair, bookshelves, library and other items from NMS

What would need to change at NMS (rooms) to accommodate K-5? What would no longer be available that is now to the current students at NMS?

How would gym space be divided among kids?

Would an addition be needed? You outlined in your presentation that there is not enough classrooms at present? What is the solution?

Would the gym be modified and would the attached unit in the gym at NES be moved? Cost if it is? If a decision was made, would these items be "Guaranteed" to be completed?

How would the reduction to 1 soccer field be addressed?

I had also asked for cost of playground equipment being moved and what could not be moved. I understand that this report may be a couple more weeks but a couple more weeks in the next meeting... Concerned about this fact.

Also in addition to this... Would all of these items need to be reported in a separate report to show if Millville school would close also? As well as the costs that would present itself with relocation of playground equipment?

NMS TO NHS (6 - 12)

How do you do the configuration of how many classrooms are needed when dealing with 6-8 that goes by classroom and 9-12 that goes by student? In this calculation is there any consideration to classes currently offered and which ones may not be available due to reduced space? If so, details on what they would be?

What renovations would need to be completed to have 6-12 at NHS?

How would gym use be calculated to meet requirements and give NHS the ability to keep there electives in place that are currently available?

Again what work is "Guaranteed" to be done to ensure that schools remain effective?

I understand that we have not discussed previously the NMS TO NHS but wanted to include it as this is imperative information for our community and parents to make informed decisions and to ensure that all data is provided.

I have also noticed that the comment listed below has not been updated to show the condition on the floor tiles. Can you confirm what the results of your review was?

Another concern is the people that use our schools for rentals? Can they be accommodated if one school was to close? The play a very active role in providing outside activities an opportunity for our children and would need to be considered.

It has now been 21 days since the first meeting and we are less than 5 weeks away from meeting #2 in which this data is needed for review for PSSC of three schools and other parties for preparation and completion of presentation. With this clustering of schools it has now made the work load three times harder and more time needed by a large group of people. We need this information very soon as you can appreciate.

I understand your last couple of weeks have been busy with other sustainability studies but feel this information is essential to the outcome of our schools and wanted to ensure that when it arrives on the portal that I would be advised.

One last comment, if this information is unable to be completed within a short time, can we request the DEC to have our public meeting date changed?
