3. School Benefits:

Because we are a smaller staff, we are more aware of the needs in each other's classrooms and we can support each other and often the students in each other's rooms as well. We have an excellent PSSC committee as well as a Home and School committee, both strongly supporting our staff and students. We have a Core Leadership Team with a focus on School Improvement goals, a PBIS Team which focuses on Positive Work and Learning Environment with a focus on 7 Habits of Highly effective people, school wide K.I.D.S matrix (Kind, Involved, Dependable, Safe), PLC are engrained as staff are meeting in teams at least once a week to discuss students concerns, needs, to share teaching ideas and best practices, student data, etc.

Being a K-8 school has provided many opportunities for the older students to demonstrate leadership and mentorship to the younger students a regular basis, flexible grouping opportunities that open doors for all students to build confidence in themselves socially, emotionally, and academically.

We are involved with District Subject coordinator and Lead to look at our Social /Emotional Learning.

English Subject Coordinator to enhance literacy at the middle school level (Supporting Adolescent Readers and Three Tiers of Instruction and intervention for reading). Director of Curriculum/English Subject Coordinator/ Alignment Champion chose Bath Community School as a participant in a Literacy focus K to 2 to increase engagement. Math and Science Subject Coordinators are involved in our school each year. Our Math Subject coordinator chose our school for a project with Math White Board tables.

With our Early childhood centre, STEP -AHEAD, we also know our pre-kindergarten students very well when they enter our Kindergarten classes. Our EST-R teacher along with our EST-R lead/ Autism Lead/ and Speech Language Pathologist also visit our Pre-Kindergarten students. They participate in observations and EA requests. These people also have participated in our Pre-Kindergarten Roll out day/evening. Our kindergarten teacher also stops in to visit our pre-kindergarten students frequently. These students also share our gym, playground equipment and office visits.

4. School Challenges:

Smaller populations don't allow for flexible classroom compositions; physical space is limited. Elementary gym for middle school students, library is not attached to school it is in a portal, office is a makeshift classroom renovated, storage, restrooms are shared with pre-k and middle students, no changing rooms.

Speech therapy is done in the hallway by the bathrooms with the upstairs students (noise, no privacy, distracting to the students she is working with), ISD has to float around between offices to find private spaces to work with students, the SIW worker has no office or private space to work one on one with a student (in the computer lab right now, which does not work if there is a class in there), teachers have no space to do assessments with their students (other than sitting in the hallway, or if it's not a library day we could go outside to the portable, which is not convenient), the gym is small and does not accommodate middle school curriculum and sports. Our kitchen is small and cramped, but the volunteers make it work!
